






By country: 24 of the top 50 countries are in Africa




Age-standardized prevalence rates (per 100,000 population) of PUD in 204 countries globally by sociodemographic index in 2019





Forty-four years of endoscopy records in Zambia












Reporting of gastric cancer cases

Over half (53%) African countries do not have population based national cancer registries, IARC 2022










Forty-four years of endoscopy records in Zambia


